

## PHIMC Leads at National Network of Public Health Institutes Annual Conference

PHIMC staff participated in the National Network of Public Health Institutes (NNPHI) annual conference, From Innovation to Ideas: Partnerships, Policy, and Practice, in Washington, DC in May. The conference brought together multi-sector stakeholders to share strategies for improving public health practice and improving population health at the local, state, and federal levels. Topics included preventing opioid overdose, linking behavioral health and public health, healthy aging, and skill building for health strategists.

Executive Director Karen A. Reitan was on the development and implementation team for a preconference interactive design lab: "Urgency, Opportunity, Hope: Designing Opioid Misuse Prevention Strategies." She presented at this hands-on learning lab for health practitioners working at the state, tribal, and community levels to prevent opioid misuse.

Program Manager Meghana Menon led a round table discussion entitled "Building Partnerships to Develop a Data Sharing Strategy Across Health and Education Sectors." Meghana manages PHIMC's maternal and child health initiatives, including the School Health Access Collaborative, a citywide, cross-sector coalition that aims to strengthen the school health system to improve outcomes for Chicago students.

#### Proviso Partners for Health Host Senator Durbin



Senator Richard J. Durbin (D-IL) met with Proviso Partners for Health (PP4H) leaders and community partners to discuss health equity and learn about PP4H's systems-change work. PHIMC is a proud partner of PP4H, a community-driven, multi-sector coalition promoting community health, health equity, and transformational systemic change in the Proviso neighborhoods of Maywood, Bellwood, Broadview, and Melrose Park. Senator Durbin connected with PP4H as part of his Chicago HEAL (Hospital Engagement, Action, and Leadership) Initiative, which is dedicated to reducing community violence by working with ten Chicago-area hospitals and the communities they serve. PHIMC also congratulates PP4H and its partners who worked to successfully pass Tobacco 21 legislation which raises the minimum age to purchase tobacco products from 18 to 21 at the state level; Illinois Governor JB Pritzker signed the legislation into law in May. Senator Durbin has now taken the legislation to the national stage, co-sponsoring the bipartisan Tobacco 21 Act in the Senate. # PHIMC and Illinois Safe Schools Alliance Advocate for LGBTQ Youth

PHIMC Program Manager Meghana Menon and Illinois Safe Schools Alliance (the Alliance) Policy & Advocacy Manager Rodrigo Anzures-Oyorzabal joined Equality Illinois in Springfield in May to

advocate for LGBTQ youth, especially the <u>Inclusive Curriculum Bill</u>, which would ensure the contributions of LGBTQ people are included in Illinois public school curricula. The bill has passed the Illinois House and Senate and now awaits Governor JB Pritzker's signature.

Soon after, Illinois Governor JB Pritzker signed an <u>executive order</u> in support of non-binary, transgender, and gender nonconforming students. The executive order will create a task force to make recommendations regarding how to create affirming learning environments for all students and how Illinois State Board of Education can implement such policies. Congratulations to the Alliance and all the partners working to create safe and affirming environments for LGBTQ+ young people in schools.
